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### 2. Statutory aims

Adelante África is an NGO which supports development projects, primarily in the district of Kakumiro, since the division in 2016 of the former district of Kibaale, in Uganda.

The aims specified in our statutes are:

- a) To work with people in the local community to protect the most vulnerable children.
- b) To promote and support education at all levels.
- c) To raise funds to support educational projects and also agricultural and other development projects that empower families in the local Community.
- d) To hand over responsibility for infrastructures to members of the local community and work towards making these efficient and self-sufficient as soon as possible.

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### 4. Projects, results and beneficiaries

#### 4.1. Omwaana Tugende Children's Home

##### 4.1.a. Description of the project

**Omwaana Tugende Children's Home** for abandoned and abused children takes in children from all over the districts of Kakumiro y Kibaale, and is run in conjunction with the District Probation Office.

The ethos of the home is to recreate, as far as possible, a typical Ugandan home. For this reason the children live in small houses each with its own specific caretakers and a close relationship between the children is fostered. The home also has a vegetable garden that supplies fruit, vegetables and pulses and which gives the children the opportunity to learn basic farming techniques. All the children attend St Joseph's primary school,

with the youngest ones attending the Adelante Africa Nursery School. The home has accommodated an average of 60 children during 2016.

We are committed to the Ministry's programme of resettlement and put a lot of effort into trying to resettle children with family members or where that is not possible with families in the community.

#### Other services within this activity:

**The animal husbandry project**, set up in 2014 and still ongoing, has given the children of the Home valuable experience in looking after livestock at the same time as providing them with eggs and meat.

**The family visiting programme**, encourages members of the local community to take children into their homes for short periods of time, generally weekends and holidays. The families that express an interest, receive a visit from the Home's social worker or the warden and complete a questionnaire before being accepted. The aim of the programme is to establish links between the children and neighbouring families as a source of stability, support and affection for the future.

**Community Hall.** In 2013 a community hall was opened as part of the Omwaana Tugende Children's Home complex. It has independent access and is proving to be a great advantage both for the Home and for the community. The hall has solar powered lighting, which means that during a power cut the Home has some light and it is open to the whole community as a meeting place. Other NGOs, schools and local government councils are welcome to use it for seminars, presentations and meetings. Moreover, it houses one of the classes of the Adelante Africa nursery school and is where the children of Omwaana Tugende Children's Home have their meals and evening lessons and do their homework.

##### The beneficiaries and how they are helped:

In the area where we work there is a high incidence of one-parent families (usually the mother) or families where both parents have died, often of AIDS, the incidence of which is growing again. The children who are taken into the Home are from the districts of Kakumiro or Kibaale and are orphans or abandoned children whose family can't be located or for some reason can not look after them.

We focus on the whole child and they get the nutrition, health care and affection they need to grow into healthy and well-balanced adults. The sense of belonging to a family and a community is encouraged and the children play, help with household tasks, and go to school together.

There are also a number of families who receive emergency loans or direct aid. These are selected after carefully monitoring and interviews with the mother to determine the best way to give them support. In most cases we help with the school fees of their children.

##### Requirements to qualify as a beneficiary:

The necessary requirements are only to reside in the area where the project is carried out and to be in a situation of vulnerability and poverty. In the case of the children admitted into the children's home, they need to have court orders, officially recommending them for institutional care.

#### 4.1.e. Results obtained and degree of compliance with statutory aims

##### Results:

Omwaana Tugende Children's Home follows the guidelines set out by the Ministry of Equality, Labour and Social Development of Uganda and been praised for its integration into the local community, for its programme of family stays and for its resettlement of children. The home is in a very good position to obtain official recognition from the Ministry and inclusion in the National Registry of Children's Homes in 2017.

##### Degree of compliance with statutory aims:

The Children's Home is fundamental to the achievement of the overall aims of the NGO. Thanks to the contributions and support received from our members and collaborators, the plans foreseen for 2016 were almost 100% achieved.

## 4.2. Educational projects

### 4.2.a. Description of the projects

These projects are aimed at promoting education among the most disadvantaged. They include the following services:

**St Joseph's Primary School.** St Joseph's is a state school, initially built by the local community and later rebuilt by Adelante África, for orphans, many of whom are AIDS orphans, and the children of refugees and families living in extreme poverty. Children from the local community who can pay school fees also attend. The number of pupils has increased from 75 in 2008 to 616 at the end of 2016.

Adelante Africa pays the fees of the orphans and children of the poorest immigrant families at the school (129 in 2016). We also pay for the weekly visits of a nurse and the medicines she prescribes as well as collaborating with the families to provide a daily cup of porridge for all the children.

In 2016 additional funds were sent to provide bunk beds for the school dormitories.

**Secondary School Sponsorship programme.** Since Adelante África started to be involved in St Joseph's School, and as part of the development plans for the community, we have looked for secondary school sponsors. These are for the children who, although they did well in the PLE (Primary Leaving Exam) would not be able to continue into secondary education because they are orphans or come from one parent or very poor families. There are few state secondary schools in Uganda and none that get good results in the area so the only option for bright but poor children is to go to boarding schools. All the children who are sponsored sign a commitment to help another child through secondary school once they have finished their education and have a job. In 2016 there were 129 children sponsored in secondary boarding schools or in further education. Some of them will move to the Adelante Africa Secondary School in 2017.

**The Building of the Adelante África Secondary School.** In 2015 we took the decision to build a non-profit and non-denominational secondary school. The objective was, and is, to provide a quality secondary education where children from this poor rural area, including vulnerable children, who have passed the exams at the end of Primary education, can fulfil their potential.

In 2016 the construction of the first phase was completed. This consists of two blocks with 2 classrooms each, an administration block with a teachers' room, a block that will house two laboratories (which still need to be completed inside), a block of latrines, teacher's quarters comprising 8 rooms and a kitchen. The second phase (planned for 2017) will include the completion of the interiors of the laboratories as well as dormitories and bathrooms for the students.

The money invested in 2016 exceeded 200,000 euros and came entirely from private contributions.

The school opened its doors in February 2017, as planned. The NGO intends to allocate 20 scholarships for every 50 students and also to promote the sponsorship of teachers' salaries.

**F.A.L. (Functional Adult Literacy).** According to local government figures, 90% of the adult population of Igayaza is illiterate. The teachers of the Functional Adult Literacy Groups help adults to read and write at the same time as widening their knowledge in the areas of health, agriculture and human rights. The project is run in collaboration with the District Community Development Office, which provides the books. Adelante África pays the salaries of the teachers and the members of the F.A.L. groups themselves pay for everyday items such as chalk.

By the end of 2016 there were 8 F.A.L. groups (twice as many as the year before) in 8 different villages with a total membership of 716. The teachers rotate, spending 3 weeks with each group. Adelante Africa offers each teacher a loan to buy a bicycle to help them do this. Also, in November, we funded a four-day training course for all F.A.L. teachers, given by two experienced trainers.

**The Adelante África Nursery School.** In September 2013 a nursery school was opened in the Omwaana Tugende Community Hall from 8 a.m. to 1 p.m. every day. The lessons are in English to lay a sound foundation for Primary School. The school is non-profit and Adelante África pays the fees of the orphans and of the children

from the Children's Home who attend. In 2016 two new teachers joined the staff and there were 3 levels with 65 children in total attending the school.

### **The beneficiaries and how they are helped:**

The beneficiaries of St Joseph's primary school, 516 children in total, receive a weekly visit from a nurse and the medicines she brings, both funded by Adelante Africa. We also contribute the sugar for the daily porridge for all the children, and we pay the school fees of orphans or children living in a state of extreme poverty.

The beneficiaries of the secondary sponsorship program are orphans or children from very poor families who, otherwise, even if they passed the primary school leaving exams, would not be able to continue into secondary school. Their sponsors pay the school fees and meals, with a cost of about 30 euros per month per student.

In the adult education program (F.A.L.), more than 700 poor or extremely poor people in the community, 80% of whom are women, are learning to read and write while gaining practical knowledge, mainly in the areas of agricultural techniques, starting small income generating businesses and health education.

The beneficiaries of the nursery school come from the neighbourhood closest to the Home and also include the children of 3 to 5 years old living in the Home itself. This facilitates their integration into the community. Children receive a quality kindergarten education, in English, at a low cost or free of charge for those who come from vulnerable families or are orphans. It also means that mothers can work in the mornings without having to take care of their children at the same time.

The potential beneficiaries of the secondary school will be pupils who have passed the Primary Leaving Exams but whose families lack the resources to continue into secondary education.

### **Requirements to qualify as a beneficiary:**

The necessary requirements are only to reside in the area where the project is carried out and to be in a situation of vulnerability and poverty. In the case of children in the secondary school sponsorship programme the sponsored children also have to commit to helping another child in need to complete their secondary school once they have a job.

## **4.2.e. Results obtained and degree of compliance with statutory aims**

### **Results:**

**St Joseph's School** continues to have a good reputation in the area attracting more pupils and with very motivated teachers. The number of orphans is increasing which means we can give a quality education to more children who might otherwise not attend school at all as well as providing an important support to their families or guardians.

The school remains the highest achiever in the PLE (Primary Leaving Exams) of the government schools in the area.

**The Secondary School Sponsorship Programme** grew and diversified with Adelante África sponsoring more children in secondary boarding schools but also in schools in the village and in further education.

**The F.A.L (Functional Adult Literacy)** is becoming well known in the area with more and more villages applying to Adelante Africa to support a FAL group. The regular teachers meetings and networking between the FAL groups has increased communications and an interchange of experiences between the villages.

**The Nursery School** is very popular. It was necessary to increase the number of teachers and classes in order to accommodate the 65 children who attended the school in 2016.

The phased building of **the Adelante Africa Secondary School** is continuing as planned. At the end of 2016 the first phase was completed and the school opened its door to children in the first two years of secondary education in February 2017.

Degree of compliance with statutory aims:

Adelante Africa's educational projects are fundamental to the achievement of the overall aims of the NGO. Thanks to the contributions and support received from our members and collaborators, the plans foreseen for 2016 were almost 100% achieved.

## 4.3. Community Development and Health projects

### 4.3.a. Description of the projects

The aim is to empower people as individuals or in cooperative groups to start or expand income generating projects and in this way to foment their family's income so enabling them to care for themselves and their children. We also promote various interventions, including health projects, with the ultimate goal of improving the standard of living of families in the area.

This includes the following projects:

**Community loans (micro-finance):** These are to help community members with few or no resources to start small income generating businesses to improve the living conditions of their families. Loans are returned through regular installments to the Children's Home. There is no monetary interest, but the beneficiaries undertake to make a contribution in kind or labour to benefit the children in the Children's Home.

**The Igayaza women's sewing group:** This is currently composed of women from neighbouring villages who come twice a week to learn how to sew. In total there are 24 members in the group with 3 teachers and they have 5 sewing machines provided by Adelante Africa. Adelante Africa pays the rent of the premises and the salaries of the teachers. We also buy fabrics with African designs and purchase the products that the students make like cushion covers, aprons, backpacks, pencil cases, etc. The profits made finance this and other projects in the village.

**The Oil Press Project:** The project pursues a dual purpose, to offer an alternative cash crop to farmers in the area and to provide healthier cooking oil for families in the community (they currently use palm oil). The press began working in early 2016 and is already producing sunflower oil for the local market as well as animal feed.

**Homemade water tanks:** This is a project to help families build their own tanks to harvest rainwater from their roofs.

The construction of each tank cost about 125 euros. Families are organized in groups and each family in the group must raise the equivalent of 27 euros. Once the group is ready, Adelante Africa rents a truck to deliver the materials to the houses and helps them build the water tanks. By the end of 2015, more than 100 tanks had been built and 80 new tanks were added to this number in 2016.

**The deep well and piped water project:** In 2015, Adelante Africa decided to embark on an ambitious project to extract groundwater from a deep well and channel it to the Adelante África Secondary School, two primary schools, the village's government health centre, the Children's Home and two nearby villages. With the help of World Vision, the well now covers the needs of the two primary schools, the secondary school and the government health centre. Plans to also supply two nearby villages have been suspended for the time being, pending the realisation of plans announced by the central government to get water to these communities.

**Green Vegetables project:** The project aims to increase the consumption of green vegetables in the community. Adelante Africa provides free green vegetable seeds, both native and imported, to cooperative groups. Once they have grown their crops and have a surplus, they are asked to make a small contribution to the children at the Omwaana Tugende Children's Home. Adelante Africa has maintained its support for the project in 2016.

**Vitamin A Project:** Vitamin A helps prevent childhood blindness and reduces the effects of other diseases such as measles. In 2013, Adelante Africa partnered with Healing Wings and World Vision to undertake an ambitious Vitamin A project. This has continued up to and including 2016 with Adelante Africa distributing Vitamin A and deworming capsules to children in the Sub-county of Birembo twice during the year. It has also maintained its support for the Poultry Vaccination Project in which chickens are vaccinated against Newcastle disease and avian flu also twice a year.

**Other health projects.** In 2016, two Spanish doctors, currently employed in National Health Service Hospitals in Madrid, and members of Adelante Africa, went to Uganda and worked as volunteers performing simple operations in the Kakumiro Government Health Centre.

##### The beneficiaries and how they are helped:

All the beneficiaries live in poverty or extreme poverty and in areas where there are few or no economic resources. We work with the local communities to help give support and resources to improve the standard of living of families in the area.

##### Requirements to qualify as a beneficiary:

The necessary requirements are only to reside in the area where the project is carried out and to be in a situation of vulnerability and poverty. In the case of the community loans, we select the beneficiaries according to their needs, the number of people who will benefit from the project they want to undertake and their trustworthiness. Also they are asked to agree to give something in kind or through their labour to the Children's Home as part of their loan agreement.

#### 4.3.e. Results obtained and degree of compliance

##### Results:

The **community loans project** has proved to be one of the most successful initiatives of Adelante Africa and is a motor of change. People continue to pay back their loans and the project gives the hope of a better future to many families in the area.

**This year the women's Sewing Group of Igayaza** has changed direction and it now comprises a group of young women who have not been able to go to secondary school and whose only alternative to learning how to sew would be to become solely subsistence farmers.

The projects started in previous years, **the Oil Press**, the **Homemade water tank project** and the **Green Vegetables Project** continue to work well and give encouraging results.

**The Vitamin A and deworming project** is now established as a biannual campaign and is much appreciated by families living in the villages.

##### Degree of compliance with statutory aims:

These projects are fundamental to the achievement of the overall aims of the NGO. Thanks to the contributions and support received from our members and collaborators, the plans foreseen for 2016 were almost 100% achieved.

## 5. Human resources

### 5.1 Volunteers and employees

Adelante África is made up entirely of volunteers and has no salaried employees.

The number of volunteers working with Adelante África in 2016 was 32. Of these there were 18 members in Spain and the UK and 14 in Uganda.

The volunteers in Uganda are local leaders with energy and influence in the community, members of local and central government, teachers, young Catholic priests and local businesswomen. They all give their time and efforts voluntarily to the NGO and Adelante Africa Spain only pays the small quantities incurred in transport and telephone calls while working on the projects.

The members of the organisation in Spain evaluate and follow up the projects on the ground through telephone calls and visits to Uganda. They keep in close contact with the local authorities and NGOs visiting them whenever possible. They raise money to support and extend the projects by organising events, selling products made by the Igayaza Women's Sewing Group in Uganda and looking for new members. They also work to inform, especially young people in schools, about what life is like in this part of Uganda.

During 2016, the Secretary of the N.G.O. conducted 3 follow-up visits up with an average duration of four weeks each. The member responsible for secondary school sponsorship made two visits and the member responsible for the new Secondary School also visited, focusing on the supervision of the start-up of the school, the selection of teachers and the preparation of official documentation. The members themselves paid for all the expenses incurred in these trips.

### 5.2. Offices, Expenses and Sources of Funding

#### **Offices of the NGO**

The NGO has no physical office. Post and official documents are sent to the offices of a lawyer who allows the NGO to use her address free of charge.

#### **Expenses**

Everyone who works with Adelante África does so on a voluntary basis. All members and volunteers put their own private resources towards the achievement of the NGO's aims and everything which is needed to fulfil its functions, be it paper, photocopying, printing or other necessities are paid for by members and not taken out of the NGOs funds. The same is true for flights and all travel expenses.

#### **Grants and public funding**

The NGO received no government grant or public funding in 2016. All funds given to Adelante Africa came from private individuals and in a few cases, private companies.

## 6. Salaries of Governing Body

As is stated in art. 28 of the organisation bylaws, all members of the governing body provide their services voluntarily, and do not receive any type of salary or remuneration from the NGO.

All travel expenses incurred by any of the members of the governing body are assumed and paid for with personal funds.
