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2. Statutory aims

Adelante África is an NGO which supports development projects, primarily in the district of Kakumiro, since the division in 2016 of the former district of Kibaale, in Uganda.

The aims specified in our statutes are:

- a) To work with people in the local community to protect the most vulnerable children.
- b) To promote and support education at all levels.
- c) To raise funds to support educational projects and also agricultural and other development projects that empower families in the local Community.
- d) To hand over responsibility for infrastructures to members of the local community and work towards making these efficient and self-sufficient as soon as possible.

4. Projects, results and beneficiaries

4.1. Omwaana Tugende Children's Home

4.1.a. Description of the project

Omwaana Tugende Children's Home for abandoned and abused children takes in children from all over the districts of Kakumiro y Kibaale, and is run in conjunction with the District Probation Office. It is officially recognised by the Ugandan Government as a Home for abandoned and extremely vulnerable children.

The ethos of the home is to recreate, as far as possible, a typical Ugandan home. For this reason the children live in small houses each with its own specific caretakers and a close relationship between the children is fostered. The home also has a vegetable garden that supplies fruit, vegetables and pulses and which gives the children the opportunity to learn basic farming techniques. All the children attend St Joseph's primary school, with the youngest ones attending the Adelante África Nursery School. The home has accommodated 79 children during 2017.

Other services within this activity:

The animal husbandry project, set up in 2014 and still ongoing, has given the children of the Home valuable experience in looking after livestock at the same time as providing them with eggs and meat.

Community Hall. In 2013 a community hall was opened as part of the Omwaana Tugende Children's Home complex. It has independent access so that other NGOs, schools and public organisations can use it for seminars, presentations and meetings. It also houses the Adelante África Nursery School and is where the children of the Omwaana Tugende Children's Home have their meals, receive extracurricular evening classes and do their homework. The hall has solar-powered lighting, which means that during a power cut it has some light.

The family visiting and/or resettlement programme, encourages members of the local community to take children into their homes for short periods of time, generally weekends and holidays. It also encourages the safe return of children to live with their own families or with foster families. In the latter case, Adelante África pays the school fees and maintenance costs of the rehoused children. In 2017 17 children were resettled, making a total of 49 children since from the Children's Home opened.

Emergency aid to families with orphans or suffering extreme poverty. The programme aims to support vulnerable families to enable them to look after their own children. It also supports vulnerable children in some remote schools in the area.

The beneficiaries and how they are helped:

In the area where we work there is a high incidence of one-parent families (usually the mother) or families where both parents have died, often of AIDS, the incidence of which is growing again. The children who are taken into the Home are abandoned or vulnerable children. They receive the health care, affection and nutrition they need and have the chance to live in a community, play with other children, help with domestic tasks and attend school.

There are also a number of families who receive emergency loans or direct aid. These are selected after carefully monitoring and interviews with the mother to determine the best way to give them support. In most cases we help with the school fees of their children.

Requirements to qualify as a beneficiary:

The necessary requirements are only to reside in the area where the project is carried out and to be in a situation of vulnerability and poverty. In the case of the children admitted into the children's home, they need to have court orders, officially recommending them for institutional care.

4.1.e. Results obtained and degree of compliance with statutory aims

Results:

Omwaana Tugende Children's Home follows the guidelines set out by the Ministry of Equality, Labour and Social Development of Uganda and been praised for its integration into the local community, and for its programme of family stays and resettlement of children.

Degree of compliance with statutory aims:

The Children's Home is fundamental to the achievement of the overall aims of the NGO. Thanks to the contributions and support received from our members and collaborators, the plans foreseen for 2017 were almost 100% achieved.

4.2. Educational projects

4.2.a. Description of the projects

These projects are aimed at promoting education among the most disadvantaged. They include the following services:

St Joseph's Primary School. St Joseph's is a state school, initially built by the local community and later rebuilt by Adelante África, for orphans and for the children of refugees and families living in extreme poverty. Children from the local community who cannot pay school fees also attend. The number of pupils has increased from 75 in 2008 to 516 at the end of 2017. Adelante África pays the fees of the children in the home, orphans and other children in extreme situations. We also pay for the weekly visits of a nurse and the medicines she prescribes, as well as collaborating with the families to provide a daily cup of porridge for all the children.

Secondary School Sponsorship programme. Since Adelante África initial involvement in St Joseph's Primary School, and as part of the development plans for the community, we have looked for secondary school sponsors. These are for the children who, although they did well in the PLE (Primary Leaving Exam) would not be able to continue into secondary education because they are orphans or come from one parent or very poor families. There are few state secondary schools in Uganda and none that get good results in the area, so the only option for bright but poor children is to go to boarding school. All the children who are sponsored sign a commitment to help another child through secondary school once they have finished their education and have a job.

There are 134 children sponsored in secondary education or vocational training, including those who moved to the new Adelante África Secondary School in 2017.

The Adelante África Nursery School. In September 2013 a nursery school was opened in the Omwaana Tugende Community Hall from 8 a.m. to 1 p.m. every day. The lessons are in English to lay a sound foundation for the children's primary education. The school is non-profit and Adelante África pays the fees of the orphans and of the children from the Children's Home. In 2017 there were 3 levels with 65 children in total attending the school.

The Adelante África Secondary School. Our school is a non-profit and non-denominational secondary school. We aim to provide quality secondary education so that the most vulnerable children who have passed the exams on completing primary school can continue studying for the Ugandan Certificate of Education.

After construction of the first phase was completed, the school opened in February 2017, as planned, with levels S1 and S2. At the end of the first year there are 104 pupils, 53 boys and 51 girls, of which 93 are boarders.

At the same time, throughout 2017 we completed the second phase of construction, which consists of a laboratory, dormitories for the pupils and bathrooms. The money invested was around 135,000 euros and came entirely from private contributions.

Phase three of the project, which includes among other things a library and a second teachers' block, will be carried out during 2018.

F.A.L. (Functional Adult Literacy). According to local government figures, 90% of the adult population of Igayaza is illiterate. The teachers of the Functional Adult Literacy Groups teach women and men in the community to read and write, at the same time as widening their practical knowledge in the areas of health, agriculture and human rights. Adelante África pays the teachers' salaries and the members of the F.A.L. groups pay for their own everyday items, such as chalk.

In 2017 we continued to support 8 F.A.L. groups. The groups participated this year in workshops where they learnt to make medicinal soap and also chairs using dried banana leaves. Training continued in the construction of water tanks in order to make use of rainwater and in sewing and tending different kinds of vegetables.

The beneficiaries and how they are helped:

The beneficiaries of St Joseph's primary school receive a weekly visit from a nurse and the medicines she brings, both funded by Adelante África. We also contribute the sugar for the daily porridge for all the children, and we pay the school fees of orphans or children living in a state of extreme poverty.

The beneficiaries of the secondary sponsorship program are orphans or children from very poor families who, otherwise, even if they passed the primary school leaving exams, would not be able to go on to secondary school. Their sponsors pay the school fees and meals, with a cost of about 30 euros per month per student.

The beneficiaries of the nursery school mainly come from the neighbourhood closest to the school but also include the youngest children (3 -5 year-olds) from the Children's Home. This facilitates their integration into the community. Children receive a quality kindergarten education, in English, at a low cost or free of charge for those who come from vulnerable families or are orphans. It also means that mothers can work in the mornings without having to take care of their children at the same time.

The beneficiaries of the Secondary school are pupils who have passed the Primary school leaving exams with good grades but whose families are not able to fund their secondary education.

In the adult education program (F.A.L.), more than 1,000 poor or extremely poor people in the community, 80% of whom are women, are learning to read and write while gaining practical knowledge, mainly in the areas of agricultural methods, the setting up of small income-generating businesses and health education.

Requirements to qualify as a beneficiary:

The necessary requirements are only to reside in the area where the project is carried out and to be in a situation of vulnerability and poverty. Sponsored children in the secondary school programme, also have to commit to helping another child in need to complete secondary school once they have a job.

4.2.e. Results obtained and degree of compliance with statutory aims

Results:

St Joseph's School continues to have an excellent reputation in the area attracting more pupils and with very motivated teachers. The number of orphans continues to increase which means we can give a quality education to children who might otherwise not be able to attend school at all, as well as providing important support to their families or guardians.

The school continues to have the best results in the PLE (Primary Leaving Exams) of the government schools in the area.

The Secondary School Sponsorship Programme grew and diversified with Adelante África sponsoring more children in secondary boarding schools but also in local schools in the area and in further education.

The Nursery School is very popular. In 2017 26 children finished nursery school and went on to start their first year of Primary school. During the year, students from the Teacher Training Institute came to do their teaching practice at our nursery school.

The phased construction of **the Adelante África Secondary School** is continuing as planned. 2017 was the first year in operation for the school. There were 104 pupils, 53 boys and 51 girls, in the first two years of secondary education. 93 of the pupils were boarders.

The F.A.L Group (Functional Adult Literacy) is very well known in the area with more and more villages applying to Adelante África to support a FAL group. The regular teachers' meetings and joint projects between the FAL groups has increased communication and the sharing of experiences between the villages.

Degree of compliance with statutory aims:

Adelante África's educational projects are fundamental to the achievement of the overall aims of the NGO. Thanks to the contributions and support received from our members and collaborators, the projects planned for 2017 were carried out almost fully.

4.3. Development and Health projects

4.3.a. Description of the projects

The aim is to empower individuals or groups to set up or expand income-generating projects and in this way to boost the local economy. We also promote and support various interventions, including health projects, with the ultimate goal of improving the living standards of families in the area.

This includes the following projects:

Community loans (micro-finance): These are to help community members with few or no resources to start small income generating businesses to improve the living conditions of their families. Loans are returned through regular instalments to the Children's Home. There is no monetary interest, but the beneficiaries undertake to make a contribution in kind or labour to benefit the children in the Children's Home.

Sewing classes

These classes are designed for girls who are unable to attend or complete secondary school, usually because of lack of funds since secondary school is not free. The classes offer an alternative to early marriage. The girls learn to sew traditional costumes, as well as skirts, shirts and children's clothes and this allows them to have an occupation at the end of the course. Adelante África funds the rent of the premises, the sewing machines and the teachers' salaries.

The Igayaza women's sewing group: This is currently composed of women from neighbouring villages and in some cases of students who have attended the sewing classes. Adelante África buys fabrics and then purchases the items that the women make like cushion covers, aprons, backpacks, pencil cases, etc. This allows the women to cover basic necessities such as medicines and school fees. The profits made finance this and other projects in the area.

The Oil Press Project: The project has three aims: to offer an alternative cash crop to farmers in the area at a fixed purchase price, provide healthier cooking oil for families in the community (they currently use palm oil) and to contribute in the long term to making the Children's Home sustainable.

The press began working in early 2016 and since then has been producing sunflower oil for the local market as well as animal feed. As soon as the project generates a profit, this will be used to cover the operating costs of the Children's Home.

Homemade water tanks: This is a project to help families build their own tanks to harvest rainwater from their roofs. Adelante África has been continued to support the project in 2017.

Green vegetables project: The project aims to encourage the cultivation and increase the consumption of green vegetables in the community. Adelante África provides free green vegetable seeds, both native and imported, to several cooperatives. Once they have grown their crops and have a surplus, they are asked to contribute a small amount of the harvest to feeding the children at the Omwaana Tugende Children's Home. Adelante África has continued to support the project in 2017.

Vitamin A Project: Vitamin A helps prevent childhood blindness and reduces the effects of other diseases such as measles. In 2013, Adelante África partnered with the NGOs Healing Wings and World Vision. We continued to support the project and in 2017 contributed to the twice-yearly Vitamin A and deworming campaigns in the schools

and villages in the sub-county of Birembo. We also maintained our support for the **Poultry Vaccination Project** in which chickens are vaccinated against Newcastle disease and bird flu.

Other Health Projects:

Water filters: The filters provide clean drinking water, are cheap and help reduce deforestation, since there is no need to burn wood to boil water for consumption. As well as to the Children's Home and schools, Adelante África has donated filters to each of the four health centres in the area and has carried out a campaign to encourage families to acquire filters with our support.

The Igayaza Diabetes Association: Adelante África supports a self-help diabetics group, funding half the cost of their T-shirts and providing glucose metres thanks to the support of Dr Alba Galdón. During her visit to Uganda with the other doctors, Dr Galdón met with a group of diabetics to advise them and answer their questions. The group has a fund for emergencies among its members, is committed to caring for the children of a member should he/she have to be admitted to hospital and organises exercise classes on Sundays to help members keep fit and lose weight.

Medical Aid in Uganda

Following the success of the previous year, a group of surgeons and anaesthetists headed by Dr Guillermo García Serrano travelled once again to Uganda in 2017, with the support of Adelante África, to work as volunteers in the health centre and perform operations such as hernias and tumours in Kakindo, in the Kakumiro district. The project received an award from the Anesvad Foundation, consisting of 5,000€ to go towards the objectives included in the proposal.

The beneficiaries and how they are helped:

All the beneficiaries live in poverty or extreme poverty and in areas where there are few or no economic resources. We work with the local communities to help give support and resources to improve the standard of living of families in the area.

Requirements to qualify as a beneficiary:

The necessary requirements are only to reside in the area where the project is carried out and to be in a situation of vulnerability and poverty.

In the case of the community loans, we select the beneficiaries according to their needs, the number of people who will benefit from the project they want to undertake and their trustworthiness. They also commit to contributing to the sustainability of the project, paying back in kind as agreed in the loan agreement.

4.3.e. Results obtained and degree of compliance

Results:

The **community loans project** has proved to be one of the most successful initiatives of Adelante África and is a real driver of change. Beneficiaries continue to pay back their loans and the project offers hope of a better future for many families in the area.

Hairdressing and sewing classes. Women's Sewing Group of Igayaza. The project has changed its focus towards the group of young women who are not able to go to secondary school and who would be destined to become very young wives and mothers or subsistence farmers.

The projects started in previous years, such as the **Oil Press**, the **Homemade water tanks project** and the **Green vegetables project** continue to work well and give encouraging results.

The Vitamin A and deworming project along with **the bird flu project** are now established as a biannual campaign and are highly-valued by families living in the villages.

Other health projects. All the health projects have exceeded expectations. In the 2017 medical campaign 170 patients were examined and there were 51 operations, with many people on the waiting list for future campaigns. The diabetics association brought together a huge number of participants who were able to take advantage of the glucose metering, in coordination with the local health worker, and receive help in the case of a crisis.

Degree of compliance with statutory aims:

These projects are fundamental to the achievement of the overall aims of the NGO. Thanks to the contributions and support received from our members and collaborators, the plans foreseen for 2017 were almost 100% achieved.

5. Resources

5.1 Volunteers and employees

Adelante África is made up entirely of volunteers and has no salaried employees. The average number of volunteers in 2017 was 32. Of these there were 18 members in Spain and the UK and 14 in Uganda.

The members of the organisation in Spain control the funds donated by our supporters from beginning to end. They set the association's objectives and plan and monitor all the projects on the ground by intervening directing in the decisions made by the local members in Uganda. They keep in close contact with the local authorities and NGOs visiting them whenever possible. They promote the association and organise and run fund-raising events. They also visit schools throughout the year to talk about the organisation.

The volunteers in Uganda are local leaders from a variety of different backgrounds and professions. They are all influential in the community, members of regional and central government, teachers, young Catholic priests and local businesswomen. They all give their time and efforts voluntarily to the NGO and Adelante África only funds volunteers' transport expenses and telephone calls while working on the projects.

During 2017, the Secretary of the association conducted four visits to monitor the projects staying for an average of four weeks on each visit. The members responsible for the secondary school Sponsorship and Construction projects also visited, focusing on the supervision of the first year of the school and the second phase of construction. The members themselves pay the total costs of these trips.

5.2. Offices, Expenses and Sources of Funding

Offices of the NGO

Adelante África's registered office is at Calle Príncipe de Vergara 128 in the premises of a private lawyer during office hours. She allows us to use her address free of charge.

Expenses

Everyone who works with Adelante África does so on a voluntary basis. All members and volunteers put their own private resources towards the achievement of the NGO's aims. Everything required by the governing body in order to carry out their duties, be it office supplies, hardware, etc, as well as travel costs, are paid for personally by the people concerned.

Grants and public funding

All Adelante África's income comes from private individuals and fund-raising events. Members contribute with standing orders, one-off payments and sponsorship payments. The NGO received no government grant or public funding in 2017.

As stated in article 28 of the organisation's statutes, all members of the governing body provide their services to Adelante África voluntarily, and do not receive any salary, expenses or remuneration from the NGO. either when performing their duties or for duties different from those carried out as a member of the governing body.
