2. Statutory aims

We are incorporating the new wording of our statutes. The goal of the Association is to promote and participate in actions of solidarity, international cooperation and education worldwide with a particular focus on vulnerable groups and people in the African continent.

Our priority areas, though not exclusive, are the following:

- a) International cooperation for the development of the population of Africa.
- b) Promoting the development of education, health, comprehensive training or any other action that generates development in Africa.
- c) Financing and construction of infrastructures for children's care and education in Africa.
- d) Protection and safeguarding of the most vulnerable population groups in Africa.
- e) Cultural and material exchange with needy populations in Africa.
- f) Technical and economic cooperation for the development of agri-food, educational, health, social infrastructure, communications and any other projects aimed at fostering development among the most vulnerable people in Africa.
- g) Humanitarian aid.
- h) Awareness-raising in Spain of the problems of the most vulnerable people and global citizenship education.

4. Projects, results and beneficiaries

The entity's activities during the 2020 financial year have been directly affected by the pandemic. The restrictions imposed by all governments, including the Ugandan one, to protect the population from COVID-19 have caused significant economic damage among the local population and disrupted some of our projects. Nevertheless, we have been able to sustain many of them to a minimum level of operation and with the limitations that the strict Ugandan state regulation has allowed.

4.1. Omwaana Tugende Children's Home

4.1.a. Description of the project

Omwaana Tugende Children's Home for abandoned and abused children takes in children from all over the districts of Kakumiro and Kibaale in close cooperation with the District Probation Office. It is officially recognised by the Ugandan Government as a Home for abandoned and extremely vulnerable children.

The ethos of the home is to recreate, as far as possible, a typical Ugandan home. For this cause the children live in small houses each with its own specific caretakers and a close relationship between the children is fostered. The home also has a vegetable garden that supplies fruit, vegetables and pulses and which gives the children the opportunity to learn basic farming techniques. All the children attend St Joseph's primary school, with the youngest ones attending the Adelante África Nursery School. The home has maintained its daily internal activity despite having been in lock-down for most of the year, complying with all the regulations imposed by local authorities to prevent coronavirus infections. It has taken in 65 children in 2020.

The schools, however, have been closed for most of the year, so school activity has been limited to nursery classes that the director of the Nursery School has taught for the children of the home, as well as for the younger children of the teachers from Adelante Africa Secondary School.

Other services within this activity:

The animal husbandry project, set up in 2014 and still ongoing, has given the children of the Home valuable experience in looking after livestock at the same time as providing them with eggs and meat.

Community Hall. In 2013 a community hall was opened as part of the Omwaana Tugende Children's Home complex. It has independent access so that other NGOs, schools and public organisations can use it for seminars, presentations and meetings. It also houses the Adelante África Nursery School and is where the children of the Omwaana Tugende Children's Home have their meals, receive extracurricular evening classes and do their homework. The hall has solar-powered lighting, which means that during a power cut it has some light.

The family visiting and/or resettlement programme, encourages members of the local community to take children into their homes for short periods of time, generally weekends and holidays. It also encourages the safe return of children to live with their own families or with foster families. In the latter case, Adelante África pays the school fees and maintenance costs of the rehoused children. Our support has been limited to maintenance during 2020 due to the closure of schools across Uganda because of COVID-19.

Emergency aid to families with orphans or suffering extreme poverty. The programme aims to support vulnerable families to enable them to look after their own children. It also supports vulnerable children in some remote schools in the area.

The beneficiaries and how they are helped:

In the area where we work there is a high incidence of one-parent families (usually the mother) or families where both parents have died, often of AIDS, the incidence of which is growing again. The children who are taken into the Home are abandoned or vulnerable children. They receive the health care, affection and nutrition they need and have the chance to live in a community, play with other children, help with domestic tasks and attend school.

There are also a number of families who receive emergency loans or direct aid. These are selected after carefully monitoring and interviews with the mother to determine the best way to give them support. In most cases we help with the school fees of their children.

Requirements to qualify as a beneficiary:

The necessary requirements are only to reside in the area where the project is carried out and to be in a situation of vulnerability and poverty. In the case of the children admitted into the children's home, they need to have court orders, officially recommending them for institutional care.

4.1.e. Results obtained and degree of compliance with statutory aims

Results obtained:

Omwaana Tugende Children's Home follows the guidelines set out by the Ministry of Equality, Labour and Social Development of Uganda and been praised for its integration into the local community, and for its programme of family stays and resettlement of children.

Degree of compliance with statutory aims:

The Children's Home is fundamental to the achievement of the overall aims of the NGO. Thanks to the contributions and support received from our members and collaborators, and always within the Ugandan COVID-19 regulations, the activities planned for 2020 have been carried out almost to 100%.

4.2. Educational projects

4.2.a. Description of the projects

These projects are aimed at promoting education among the most disadvantaged. They include the following services:

St Joseph's Primary School. St Joseph's is a state school, initially built by the local community and later rebuilt by Adelante África, for orphans and for the children of refugees and families living in extreme poverty. Children from the local community who cannot pay school fees also attend. The number of pupils has increased from 75 in 2008 to over 500 at present. Adelante África pays the fees of the children in the home, orphans and other children in extreme situations. We also pay for the weekly visits of a nurse and the medicines she prescribes, as well as collaborating with the families to provide a daily cup of porridge for all the children.

As described in section 4.1.a., the regulations adopted by the Ugandan authorities in 2020 to combat the pandemic have forced the closure of educational centres for almost the whole year. This has obliged us to limit the resources available and to redirect our efforts.

Secondary and Vocational Sponsorship programme. Since Adelante África initial involvement in St Joseph's Primary School, and as part of the development plans for the community, we have looked for secondary school sponsors. These are for the children who, although they did well in the PLE (Primary Leaving Exam) would not be able to continue their education because they have no economic resources. All the children who are sponsored sign a commitment to help another child through secondary school once they have finished their education and have a job.

In 2020, the program has been affected by the limitations on the closure of educational centers as explained in the previous point.

The Adelante África Nursery School. In September 2013, a nursery school was opened in the Omwaana Tugende Community Hall from 8 a.m. to 1 p.m. every day. The lessons are in English to lay a sound foundation for the children's primary education. The school is non-profit and Adelante África pays the fees of the orphans and of the children from the Children's Home.

As previously stated, the school has been closed for most of the year due to COVID-19 restrictions. The school activity has been limited to the classes taught by the director of the Nursery School for the infants of the home and for the younger children of the Adelante Africa Secondary School teachers.

The Adelante África Secondary School. The school opened in February 2017. Our school is a non-profit and non-denominational secondary school. We aim to provide quality secondary education so that the most vulnerable children who have passed the exams on completing primary school can continue studying for the Ugandan Certificate of Education (UCE).

Our school has been closed most of the time for a large number of students during 2020, as in the rest of Uganda. We have nonetheless maintained support for our teachers and redirected our efforts wherever possible in response to COVID-19.

Complying with the strict national protocol and regulations to reduce the risks of covid-19 the Adelante Africa Secondary School was closed until September 2020. At that point Senior 4 students, those in the last year of secondary school who were due to take their O level exams, were allowed by the Ministry of Education to return to school. The teachers and the staff at the school have been working hard so the school repeats or improves on the exceptional results that were obtained the year before.

F.A.L. (Functional Adult Literacy). Around 90% of the adult population of Igayaza is illiterate. The teachers of the Functional Adult Literacy Groups teach women and men in the community to read and write both in their mother tongue and in English, at the same time as widening their practical knowledge in the areas of health, agriculture and human rights. Adelante África pays the teachers' salaries and gives each group T-shirts with their own distinctive motif.

The classes of the adult literacy groups (F.A.L.) were also interrupted in 2020, although we have continued to support our teachers.

The beneficiaries and how they are helped:

The beneficiaries of St Joseph's primary school receive a weekly visit from a nurse and the medicines she brings, both funded by Adelante África. We also contribute the sugar for the daily porridge for all the children, and we pay the school fees of orphans or children living in a state of extreme poverty.

The beneficiaries of the secondary and vocational training sponsorship program are orphans or children from very poor families who, otherwise, even if they passed the primary school leaving exams, would not be able to continue their studies. Their sponsors pay the school fees and meals, with a cost of about 30 euros per month per student.

The beneficiaries of the nursery school mainly come from the neighbourhood closest to the school but also include the youngest children (3-5 year-olds) from the Children's Home. This facilitates their integration into the community. Children receive a quality kindergarten education, in English, at a low cost or free of charge for those who come from vulnerable families or are orphans. It also means that mothers can work in the mornings without having to take care of their children at the same time.

The beneficiaries of the Secondary school are pupils who have passed the Primary school leaving exams with good grades but whose families are not able to fund their secondary education.

In the adult education program (F.A.L.), more than 1,000 poor or extremely poor people in the community, 80% of whom are women, are learning to read and write while gaining practical knowledge, mainly in the areas of agricultural methods, the setting up of small income-generating businesses and health education.

Requirements to qualify as a beneficiary:

The necessary requirements are only to reside in the area where the project is carried out and to be in a situation of vulnerability and poverty. Sponsored children in the secondary school programme, also have to commit to helping another child in need to complete secondary school once they have a job.

4.2.e. Results obtained and degree of compliance with statutory aims

Results obtained:

St Joseph's School continues to have an excellent reputation in the area attracting more pupils and with very motivated teachers. The number of orphans continues to increase which means we can give a quality education to children who might otherwise not be able to attend school at all, as well as providing important support to their families or guardians.

The school has been closed practically the whole of 2020 due to COVID-19 restrictions.

The Secondary and Vocational Training Sponsorship Programme grew and diversified with the sponsorship of children, not only in the Adelante África Secondary School but also in other local schools in the area and particularly in Vocational Training courses. The program was interrupted in 2020 because of the COVID-19 restrictions.

The Nursery School is very popular and keeps attracting many children under 5 years of age, distributed among three levels.

The Adelante África Secondary School already has over 250 children. The O level exams were postponed this year. However, both teachers and the rest of the school staff continue to focus on the 42 students who will take the exams as soon as allowed by the authorities.

The F.A.L Group (Functional Adult Literacy) is very well known in the area with more and more villages applying to Adelante África to support a FAL group. The COVID-19 restrictions have disrupted any type of activity of these groups in 2020.

Degree of compliance with statutory aims:

Adelante África's educational projects are fundamental to the achievement of the overall aims of the NGO. The COVID-19 pandemic has altered our entire educational program in 2020. Aiming at 2021, and as restrictions are relaxed and schools begin to teach more classes (not just the courses subject to exams), Adelante Africa will multiply its efforts to adapt to the new calendar to be published by the Ugandan government for the different levels of primary and secondary school and will allocate the usual resources to both the St. Joseph's Secondary School and Primary School, the Nursery School and the Adult Literacy groups (F.A.L.).

4.3. Development and Health projects

4.3.a. Description of the projects

The aim is to empower individuals or groups to set up or expand income-generating projects and in this way to boost the local economy. We also promote and support various interventions, including health projects, with the ultimate goal of improving the living standards of families in the area.

This includes the following projects:

Community loans (micro-finance): These are to help community members with few or no resources to start small income generating businesses to improve the living conditions of their families. Loans are returned through regular instalments with zero interest and the beneficiaries undertake to make a contribution in kind or labour in favour of the association.

Sewing and hairdressing classes. These classes are designed for girls who are unable to attend or complete secondary school, usually because of lack of funds since secondary school is not free. The classes offer an alternative to early marriage. The girls learn to sew or basic hairdressing techniques and this allows them to have an occupation at the end of the course. Adelante África funds the rent of the premises, the course materials (such as the sewing machines) and the teachers' salaries.

The Igayaza women's sewing group: This is currently composed of women from neighbouring villages and in some cases of students who have attended the sewing classes. Adelante África buys fabrics and then purchases, for further re-sale in Europe, the items that the women make like cushion covers, aprons, backpacks, pencil cases, etc. This allows the women to cover basic needs such as medicines and school fees. All funds received go to finance this and other projects in the area.

The Sunflower Oil Press: The project has three aims: to offer an alternative cash crop to farmers in the area at a fixed purchase price, to provide families in the community with a healthier oil than palm oil and to contribute in the long term to making the AA Children's Home sustainable.

The oil press began working in early 2016 and since then has been producing high quality pure sunflower oil for the local market, as well as animal feed. The project has been stable in 2020. The pandemic has had a significant economic impact on the local population. On top of this, the sunflower crop was exceptionally poor due to a season drier than usual in Uganda. Despite everything, the project has practically self-financed with resources from its own activity. With a view to next season, additional contracts have been signed with farmers and distributors not only in the area but also in the north of the country, to ensure the stock of seeds.

Homemade water tanks: This is a project to help families build their own tanks to harvest rainwater from their roofs. Adelante África has continued to support the project in 2020 albeit limited to just five families owing to COVID-19 restrictions.

Green vegetables project: The project aims to encourage the cultivation and increase the consumption of green vegetables in the community. Adelante África provides free green vegetable seeds, both native and imported, to several cooperatives. Once they have grown their crops and have a surplus, they are asked to contribute a small amount of the harvest to feeding the children at the Omwaana Tugende Children's Home. Adelante África has continued to support the project in 2020.

Vitamin A Project: Vitamin A helps prevent childhood blindness and reduces the effects of other diseases such as measles. In 2013, Adelante África partnered with the NGOs Healing Wings and World Vision. Since then, Adelante Africa has maintained its continued support. However, in 2020 and due to the pandemic, only the first of the two annual vitamin A and deworming campaigns could be launched. The annual poultry vaccination program was suspended. Both programs will resume in full in 2021.

Other Health Projects:

- **The Igayaza Diabetes Association:** Adelante África keeps supporting electronically a self-help diabetics group through the assistance and advice of Dr Alba Galdón.
- **Doctors in Uganda.** The Doctors in Uganda project was put on hold in 2020 pending the rolling out of the vaccination strategy against COVID-19. Only the first of two planned surgical campaigns was carried out, in February 2020. The campaign was particularly applauded. It was run by two maxillofacial surgeons and a paediatric anaesthetist and most of the patients undergoing surgery were children.

The beneficiaries and how they are helped:

All the beneficiaries live in poverty or extreme poverty and in areas where there are few or no economic resources. We work with the local communities to help give support and resources to improve the standard of living of families in the area.

Requirements to qualify as a beneficiary:

The necessary requirements are only to reside in the area where the project is carried out and to be in a situation of vulnerability and poverty.

In the case of the community loans, we select the beneficiaries according to their needs, the number of people who will benefit from the project they want to undertake and their trustworthiness. They also commit to contributing to the sustainability of the project, paying back in kind as agreed in the loan agreement.

4.3.e. Results obtained and degree of compliance

Results obtained:

The **community loans project** has proved to be one of the most successful initiatives of Adelante África and is a real driver of change. Beneficiaries continue to pay back their loans and the project offers hope of a better future for many families in the area.

Hairdressing and sewing classes. Women's Sewing Group of Igayaza. The project has changed its focus towards the group of young women who are not able to go to secondary school and who would be destined to become very young wives and mothers or subsistence farmers.

In 2020, both hairdressing and sewing group classes were completely discontinued due to restrictions imposed by COVID-19. However, we have continued to support the sewing teacher to weave masks that Adelante Africa has distributed among the most vulnerable in the community, along with emergency aid where necessary.

The **Oil Press** has become crucial in order to sustain the children's home and to finance many of Adelante Africa's activities. Other projects started in previous years, such as the **water tanks project** and the **green**

vegetables project continue to work well and report the expected results albeit with restrictions this year because of COVID-19.

The Vitamin A and deworming project along with **the bird flu project** are now established as a biannual campaign and are highly-valued by families living in the villages with the interruption mentioned above due to COVID-19.

Other health projects. All the health projects continue to be very well received and exceed expectations again with the restrictions imposed upon them by the pandemic in 2020.

Degree of compliance with statutory aims:

These projects are fundamental to the achievement of the overall aims of the NGO. Thanks to the contributions and support received from our members and collaborators, the plans foreseen for 2020 were almost 100% achieved, always within the COVID-19 Ugandan regulatory framework.

5. Resources

5.1 Volunteers and employees

Adelante África is made up entirely of volunteers and has no salaried employees. The number of volunteers in 2019 was 36, including 21 Ugandan volunteers who make up the local organisation in Africa, of whom 9 are board members (the Ugandan board also includes two members of AA Spain).

The members of the organisation in Spain control the funds donated by our supporters from beginning to end. They set the association's objectives and plan and monitor all the projects on the ground by intervening directing in the decisions made by the local members in Uganda. They keep in close contact with the local authorities and NGOs visiting them whenever possible. They promote the association and organise and run fund-raising events. They also visit schools throughout the year to talk about the organisation.

During 2020, the awareness-raising and outreach activities that we had been carrying out by means of talks in English in Official Language Schools in Spain mainly, have also been affected by the pandemic. The number of presentations about our activities in Uganda was reduced to two in 2020, one of which was a virtual presentation.

The volunteers in Uganda are local leaders from a variety of different backgrounds and professions. They are all influential in the community, members of regional and central government, teachers, young Catholic priests and local businesswomen. They all give their time and efforts voluntarily to the NGO and Adelante África only funds volunteers' transport expenses and telephone calls while working on the projects.

5.2. Offices, Expenses and Sources of Funding

Offices of the NGO

Adelante África's registered office is at Calle Príncipe de Vergara 128 in the premises of a private lawyer during office hours. She allows us to use her address free of charge.

Expenses

Everyone who works with Adelante África does so on a voluntary basis. All members and volunteers put their own private resources towards the achievement of the NGO's aims. All costs incurred by the governing body in order to carry out their duties, such as office supplies, hardware, etc, as well as travel costs, are paid for personally by the people concerned.

Grants and public funding

All Adelante Africa's income comes from private individuals and fund-raising events. Members contribute with standing orders, one-off payments and sponsorship payments. The NGO received no government grant or public funding in 2020.

6. Remuneration of Governing Body

As stated in article 28 of the organisation's statutes, all members of the governing body provide their services to Adelante África voluntarily, and do not receive any salary, expenses or remuneration from the NGO either when performing their duties or for duties different from those carried out as a member of the governing body.
