- f) Technical and economic cooperation for the development of agri-food, educational, health, social infrastructure, communications and any other projects aimed at fostering development among the most vulnerable people in Africa.
- g) Humanitarian aid.
- h) Awareness-raising in Spain of the problems of the most vulnerable people and global citizenship education.

4. Projects, results and beneficiaries

4.1. Omwaana Tugende Children's Home

4.1.a. Description of the project

Omwaana Tugende Children's Home for abandoned and abused children takes in children from all over the districts of Kakumiro and Kibaale in close cooperation with the District Probation Office. It is officially recognised by the Ugandan Government as a Home for abandoned and extremely vulnerable children. The ethos of the home is to recreate, as far as possible, a typical Ugandan home. For this cause the children live in small houses each with its own specific caretakers and a close relationship between the children is fostered. The home also has a vegetable garden that supplies fruit, vegetables and pulses and which gives the children the opportunity to learn basic farming techniques. All the children attend St Joseph's primary school, with the youngest ones attending the Adelante África Nursery School.

Other services within this activity:

The animal husbandry project, set up in 2014 and still ongoing, has given the children of the Home valuable experience in looking after livestock at the same time as providing them with eggs and meat.

Community Hall. In 2013 a community hall was opened as part of the Omwaana Tugende Children's Home complex. It has independent access so that other NGOs, schools and public organisations can use it for seminars, presentations and meetings. It also houses the Adelante África Nursery School and is where the children of the Omwaana Tugende Children's Home have their meals, receive extracurricular evening classes and do their homework. The hall has solar-powered lighting, which means that during a power cut it has some light.

The family visiting and/or resettlement programme encourages members of the local community to take children into their homes for short periods of time, generally weekends and holidays. It also encourages the safe return of children to live with their own families or with foster families. In the latter case, Adelante África pays the school fees and maintenance costs of the rehoused children.

Emergency aid to families with orphans or suffering extreme poverty. The programme aims to support vulnerable families to enable them to look after their own children. It also supports vulnerable children in some remote schools in the area.

The beneficiaries and how they are helped:

In the area where we work, there is a high incidence of one-parent families (usually the mother) or families where both parents have died, often of AIDS, the incidence of which is growing again. The children who are taken into the Home are abandoned or vulnerable children. They receive the health care, affection and

nutrition they need and have the chance to live in a community, play with other children, help with domestic tasks and attend school.

There are also a number of families who receive emergency loans or direct aid. These are selected after carefully monitoring and interviews with the mother to determine the best way to give them support. In most cases we help with the school fees of their children.

Requirements to qualify as a beneficiary:

The necessary requirements are only to reside in the area where the project is carried out and to be in a situation of vulnerability and poverty. In the case of the children admitted into the children's home, they need to have court orders, officially recommending them for institutional care.

4.1.e. Results obtained and degree of compliance with statutory aims

Results obtained:

Omwaana Tugende Children's Home continued its daily activities during 2023, providing home to an average of 61 children, 37 boys and 24 girls. The number of staff at the home, namely the director and five full-time care workers remained the same throughout the year. Likewise, another four workers also continued: a gatekeeper, a nightwatchman, a cook and an assistant careworker who helps with cleaning the houses and with the children's meals.

Among the main achievements of 2023 was managing to rescue some extremely vulnerable children from terrible situations, for example two girls who had been abused by their fathers and a child with HIV who was on the verge of dying from malnutrition and neglect. The home received a visit from the District psychiatrist who spoke with some of the children and gave some training to the staff on how to handle the most traumatic cases of the children.

As part of the **Family visiting and/or rehousing programme**, in 2023, 10 children from the home were rehoused legally with their own families by the representative from social affairs and another 5 were living with their foster families.

Degree of compliance with statutory aims:

The Children's Home is fundamental to the achievement of the overall aims of the NGO. Thanks to the contributions and support received from our members and collaborators the activities planned for 2023 have been carried out almost to 100%.

4.2. Educational projects

4.2.a. Description of the projects

These projects are aimed at promoting education among the most disadvantaged. They include the following services:

St Joseph's Primary School. St Joseph's is a state school, initially built by the local community and later rebuilt by Adelante África, for orphans and for the children of refugees and families living in extreme poverty. In 2023, a change in government regulations which prevented state schools from charging fees in primary education led to an exponential increase in the school population. The reason is that children whose parents kept them at home because they couldn't pay the fees are now in school. As a result, classes are enormous (in some classes there are more than 100 children crammed together in a small space) and the children are

sitting on the floor or squatting because there aren't enough desks for them. Adelante Africa's funds are extremely limited, and we have not been able to help them buy more desks, but we made a video requesting finance via social networks.

We currently continue to provide the school with medicines and pay for a nurse to visit weekly and treat the children.

The Adelante África Nursery School. In September 2013, the nursery school was opened in the Omwaana Tugende Community Hall, originally for the youngest children. The lessons are in English to lay a sound foundation for the children's primary education. The school is a non-profit organisation and, as well as the children from the Children's Home, Adelante África also supports other vulnerable children from the local community.

The school expanded in 2023 to include Primary 1. The plan for 2024 is to also add Primary 2 and hence the school will become both a nursery and lower primary school. The reason for this is to help families in the local community and provide an alternative for the children who, in order to attend St Joseph's primary school, have to walk a kilometre along a very busy tarmac road with no capacity for pedestrians.

Secondary School and Further Education Sponsorship programme. Since Adelante África's initial involvement in St Joseph's Primary School, and as part of the development plans for the community, we have looked for secondary school as well as vocational training sponsors. These are for the children who, although they did well in the PLE (Primary Leaving Exam) would not be able to continue their education because they have no economic resources. All the children who are sponsored sign a commitment to help another child through secondary school once they have finished their education and have a job.

The Adelante África Secondary School. The school opened in February 2017. Our school is a non-profit and non-denominational secondary school. We aim to provide quality secondary education so that the most vulnerable children who have passed the exams on completing primary school can continue studying for the Ugandan Certificate of Education (UCE).

F.A.L. (Functional Adult Literacy). Around 90% of the adult population of Igayaza is illiterate. The teachers of the Functional Adult Literacy Groups teach women and men in the community to read and write both in their mother tongue and in English, at the same time as widening their practical knowledge in the areas of health, agriculture and human rights. Adelante África pays the teachers' salaries and gives each group T-shirts with their own distinctive motif.

The beneficiaries and how they are helped:

The beneficiaries of St Joseph's primary school receive a weekly visit from a nurse and the medicines she brings, both funded by Adelante África. We also contribute the sugar for the daily porridge for all the children, and we pay the school fees of orphans or children living in a state of extreme poverty.

The beneficiaries of the nursery school mainly come from the neighbourhood closest to the school but also include the youngest children (3 to 5 year-olds) from the Children's Home. This facilitates their integration into the community. Children receive a quality kindergarten education, in English, at a low cost or free of charge for those who come from vulnerable families or are orphans.

The beneficiaries of the secondary and vocational training sponsorship program are orphans or children from very poor families who, otherwise, even if they passed the primary school leaving exams, would not be able to continue their studies. Their sponsors pay the school fees and meals, with a cost of about 30 euros per month per student.

The beneficiaries of the Secondary school are pupils who have passed the Primary school leaving exams with good grades but whose families are not able to fund their secondary education.

The beneficiaries of the adult education program (F.A.L.) are mainly poor or extremely poor families from the community. Almost 80% of the participants of these groups are women.

Requirements to qualify as a beneficiary:

The necessary requirements are only to reside in the area where the project is carried out and to be in a situation of vulnerability and poverty. Sponsored children in the secondary school programme, also have to commit to helping another child in need to complete secondary school once they have a job.

4.2.e. Results obtained and degree of compliance with statutory aims

Results obtained:

St Joseph's School has been affected by the new Ugandan regulations which prohibits state primary schools from charging pupils school fees. As a result, the number of pupils has increased enormously. Adelante Africa continues to provide the school with medicines and pay for a nurse to visit weekly and treat the children.

The Adelante Africa Nursery School was registered in the District in 2023 and the number of children attending the school increased to over 200 in three classes, distributed among three age groups. The director of the school gave regular training to the teachers with the least experience and the school's reputation grew. As well as the children from our Children's Home, in 2023 we also provided free education to another 15 vulnerable children in the area.

The Secondary School and Further Education Sponsorship Programme was extended and diversified with the sponsorship of children, not only in the Adelante África Secondary School but also in other local schools in the area and particularly in Vocational Training courses. In 2023 we covered the school fees of 81 pupils who are sponsored in the Adelante África Secondary School, as well as the enrolment fee and in some cases also other educational needs, of 16 students on vocational training courses.

The Adelante África Secondary School ended the 2023 school year with a total of 297 children enrolled, including the 81 children sponsored by Adelante África, with almost the same number of girls and boys. All the teachers returned at the beginning of the school year and again all have renewed their contracts for 2024. Nine sponsored pupils who completed S4 in 2023 obtained a place at St Peters Technical Institute Mubende.

During the year the bathroom drains were repaired, the water pump was replaced, 12 chairs were bought for the teachers' room and renovation of the administration block commenced. Work also began on the construction of the dining room and roofing is in progress. The second phase of paving the paths within the school grounds will begin during the holidays in the second term of 2024, with the contribution of the parents of the fee-paying pupils.

The Functional Adult Literacy Programme is being revised. After the pandemic, many of the literacy groups disbanded. At the end of 2023, there were two active English language F.A.L. groups. The focus now is aimed at providing short courses on practical subjects for adults to enrol on, instead of forming groups with long-term objectives.

Degree of compliance with statutory aims:

Adelante África's educational activities are fundamental to the achievement of the overall aims of the NGO. Thanks to the contributions and support received from our members and collaborators the activities planned for 2023 have been carried out almost to 100%.

4.3. Development and Health projects

4.3.a. Description of the projects

The aim is to empower individuals or groups to set up or expand income-generating projects and in this way to boost the local economy. We also promote and support various interventions, including health projects, with the ultimate goal of improving the living standards of families in the area.

This includes the following projects:

Sewing and hairdressing classes. The project has refocused its attention on the group of young women who cannot afford secondary school fees and are destined to become very young wives and mothers or work in subsistence farming. Adelante África funds the rent of the premises, the course materials and the teachers' salaries. Once the participants have completed the sewing course, they receive a loan with which to buy their own machines and go back to their villages. There they can start to earn a living by making clothes for their neighbours.

The Igayaza women's sewing group: This is currently composed of women from neighbouring villages and in some cases of students who have attended the sewing classes. Adelante África buys fabrics and then purchases, for further re-sale in Europe, the items that the women make like cushion covers, aprons, backpacks, pencil cases, etc. This allows the women to cover basic needs such as medicines and school fees. All funds received go to finance this and other projects in the area.

Green vegetables project: The project aims to encourage the cultivation and increase the consumption of green vegetables in the community. Adelante África provides free green vegetable seeds, both native and imported, to several cooperatives. Once they have grown their crops and have a surplus, they are asked to contribute a small amount of the harvest to feeding the children at the Omwaana Tugende Children's Home. Adelante África has continued to support the project in 2023.

Vitamin A and Chicken Vaccination Projects: Vitamin A helps prevent childhood blindness and reduces the effects of other diseases such as measles. In 2013, Adelante África partnered with the NGOs Healing Wings and World Vision. Since then, Adelante Africa has maintained its continued support.

Other Health Projects Adelante Africa. continues to provide support via the Diabetes Association in Igayaza to anyone suffering from the illness. Following the suspension of the medical campaigns as a result of the pandemic, in 2023, these were finally resumed with the help of 5 Spanish specialists, who, together with local doctors carried out various successful operations. While this is only a small project, it requires a huge effort by Adelante Africa both in organisation and funding.

The beneficiaries and how they are helped:

All the beneficiaries live in poverty or extreme poverty and in areas where there are few or no economic resources. We work with the local communities to help give support and resources to improve the standard of living of families in the area.

Requirements to qualify as a beneficiary:

The necessary requirements are only to reside in the area where the project is carried out and to be in a situation of vulnerability and poverty.

4.3.e. Results obtained and degree of compliance

Results obtained:

Hairdressing and sewing classes. Women's Sewing Group of Igayaza.

In 2023, a total of 58 students were enrolled, 24 on the hairdressing courses and 34 on the sewing courses. The project has become very popular and definitely helps families rise out of poverty, as well as providing young women with an alternative to early marriage.

The Vitamin A and deworming project and the chicken vaccination project.

In 2023, the two campaigns planned for the vaccination and vitamin A programmes were completed in coordination with the local health authorities. However, we were only able to complete one of the two chicken vaccination campaigns due to lack of funds.

Other health projects. The diabetes care programme continued to benefit numerous members of the Association in 2023. Moreover, in this year's medical campaign 52 operations were carried out successfully, 13 on children and 39 on adults. However, 32 patients were left untreated due to lack of time and another 73 needed treatments for which the necessary material was not available.

Degree of compliance with statutory aims:

These projects are fundamental to the achievement of the overall aims of the NGO. Thanks to the contributions and support received from our members and collaborators, the plans foreseen for 2023 were almost 100% achieved.

5. Resources

5.1 Volunteers and employees

Adelante Africa España has not hired any employees during 2023. All members of Adelante Africa are volunteers who make their personal resources available to the association for the achievement of its social goals. The human resources employed during the 2023 financial year was 35, including 21 Ugandan volunteers who make up the local organisation in Africa, of whom 9 are board members (the Ugandan board also includes two members of AA Spain).

The members of the organisation in Spain control the funds donated by our supporters from beginning to end. They set the association's objectives and plan and monitor all the projects on the ground by intervening directing in the decisions made by the local members in Uganda. They keep in close contact with the local authorities and NGOs visiting them whenever possible. They promote the association and organise and run fund-raising events. They also visit schools throughout the year to talk about the organisation.

During 2023, as part of the awareness-raising and outreach activities carried out in Spain by means of talks relating

to the Adelante Africa's humanitarian work in Uganda, the association's Secretary, Jane P. Cadwallader gave 2 face-to-face talks in English in different Official Language Schools in the Madrid and the Cantabria regions.

The volunteers in Uganda are local leaders from a variety of backgrounds and professions. They are all influential in the community, members of regional and central government, teachers and women who have set up their own businesses. They all give their time and efforts voluntarily to the NGO and Adelante África only funds their transport and telephone expenses while working on the projects. The Ugandan organisation also hires paid employees and workers fully dedicated to the care and support of the projects, particularly the Children's Home.

5.2. Offices, Expenses and Sources of Funding

Offices of the NGO

Adelante África's registered office is at Calle Príncipe de Vergara 128 in the premises of a private lawyer during office hours. She allows us to use her address free of charge.

Expenses

Everyone who works with Adelante África does so on a voluntary basis. All members and volunteers put their own private resources towards the achievement of the NGO's aims. All costs incurred by the governing body in order to carry out their duties, such as office supplies, hardware, etc, as well as travel costs, are paid for personally by the people concerned.

Grants and public funding

All Adelante Africa's income comes from private individuals and fund-raising events. Members contribute with standing orders, one-off payments and sponsorship payments. The NGO received no government grant or public funding in 2023.

6. Remuneration of Governing Body

As stated in article 28 of the organisation's statutes, all members of the governing body provide their services to Adelante África voluntarily, and do not receive any salary, expenses or remuneration from the NGO either when performing their duties or for duties different from those carried out as a member of the governing body.
